Right To Resist

- For the right to organise and protest
- Defend those arrested in the recent student protests
- Stop police brutality and intimidation
- Ban kettling
- Stop the cuts

The vicious police response to the recent student protests is wholly unacceptable and totally uncalled for. The baton charges and use of 'kettling' only serve to fuel anger and frustration and in part, at least, are deliberately designed to provoke strong reactions from demonstrators.

Police brutality and intimidation on demonstrations, protests and picket lines are nothing new. As the class struggle grows in the wake of the Tory/Lib-Dem government's ideology-driven attack on public services and jobs, the role of the police in 'managing' protests will continue to grow and harden.

We demand that all the charges are dropped against all students and their supporters arrested in the recent wave of student activity.

We call for a ban on 'kettling' as a means of control and intimidation of peaceful protesters. 'Kettling' has been added to the armoury of police warfare, alongside baton and horse-mounted police cavalry charges, to intimidate protesters and dissenters.

We believe that the Tory/Lib-Dem government has no majority electoral mandate for the cuts it is pushing through. People voted for the Tory-stooge Lib-Dems on a promise that they would oppose the cuts which they are now helping the Tories railroad through.

We believe 'kettling' is arbitrary imprisonment and is a direct attack on our basic human right to protest,



contravening Articles 10 and 11 of the Human Rights Act. We call on student and labour movement organisations to actively oppose 'kettling'.

What to do if you are assaulted by a police officer

Stay calm. Avoid escalating the situation and risking finding yourself the one being done for assault.

Make a mental note of the description of the person who assaulted you and ideally their name/ID (write it all down as soon as practical). Don't forget to note down when and where it happened.

Look around to see who witnessed the assault. As soon as practical, get their contact details and ask them to write a brief statement about what they saw.

Especially look around for people with cameras who may have footage/ photos of the incident. Even if they don't, they may have images of the situation a few seconds or minutes earlier which may also prove invaluable.

Take photos of your injuries as soon as possible and take more later one to show extent of bruising etc. Seek medical attention as soon as appropriate. It is difficult to take a claim forward without medical reports.



Things to do if you're stuck in a cell!

Start singing! Protest movements have a long tradition of singing protest songs in their cells when arrested. The more people in the cells the better. Teach songs to others (protesters or not!). Write new lyrics to popular songs that everyone knows. It takes up time, lifts the spirits and can play an educative role with others imprisoned.

The Paris Commune

On 18 March 1871 the workers of Paris took power in their city. For nine weeks, until they were crushed by the French army after 28 May, they formed the world's first workers' government.

Karl Marx wrote a pamphlet at the time about the Commune, *The Civil War in France*.

In it he focused on defending the Commune against its enemies. He claimed it showed, for the first time, "the political form under which to work out the economic emancipation of labour".

"Its true secret was this. It was essentially a working-class government".

The standing army had been replaced by the armed people; the legislative and executive power was wielded by workers' representatives, elected, accountable, and recallable; and all official jobs were done at workers' wages.

The Internationale

The original French words were written in June 1871 by Eugène Pottier (1816–1887, previously a member of the Paris Commune) and were originally intended to be sung to the tune of La Marseillaise. Pierre De Geyter (1848–1932) set the poem to music in 1888. His melody was first publicly performed in July 1888 and became widely used soon after.

The Internationale has been translated into many of the world's languages. It is sung traditionally with the hand raised in a clenched fist salute.

The Internationale is sung not only by socialists but also by communists and social democrats, as well as anarchists.

First verse and chorus

Arise ye workers from your slumbers

Arise ye prisoners of want

For reason in revolt now thunders

Things to do when you're released

- ✓ Starting organising and mobilising for the next protest. Kettling, police on horse back charges, arrest, imprisonment - none of these tactics should stop us from fighting back.
- ✓ Contact Right to Resist - put your story on our website, ask around see if anyone got any video footage of your arrest, if they did, get it on to YouTube, make a link to Right to Resist website.
- ✓ Organise a meeting in your college, union, etc. Tell people about the demonstration you were on, what you're fighting for, the role the police played and get other people to support the campaign. Invite a speaker from Right to Resist to speak to your union or anti-cuts group.

While in custody

✓ You don't have to say anything at all. Giving your name, address and date of birth might speed up your release. These will be checked out before you are released.

You DON'T have to say anything else.

- ✓ You will be searched & your possessions taken away.
- ✓ You have the right to have a friend or relative contacted.
- ✓ If you are under 16 the police WILL contact your parents.

✓ You have the right to see a doctor if you are sick or hurt.

✓ The police CAN photograph and fingerprint you and take a DNA sample without your consent.
